- **Dustin Gillespie**

- Dustin Gillespie is an Assistant Special Agent in Charge with the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA). His duties involve the supervision and management of the Salt Lake City District Office, and he is responsible for overseeing DEA's operations in Utah. ASAC Gillespie has served as a Special Agent with the DEA for 17 years, with tours of duty in Arizona, Virginia, and Texas.

- **Jennifer McNair**

- Jennifer McNair is the Chief Forensic Scientist at the Utah Department of Public Safety Bureau of Forensic Services where she has been employed for over 28 years. She has expertise in several forensic disciplines including seized drugs, clandestine labs, general chemical unknowns, fire debris, and paint. She has had the opportunity to examine thousands of items of evidence over the course of her career and has testified as an expert witness in federal, state, and local courts throughout Utah. She maintains professional certification through the American Board of Criminalistics in Drug Analysis. Prior to her current position, Jennifer led the Criminalistics division of the lab which includes the Firearms, Fingerprints/Impressions, Chemistry, and Evidence sections. She currently serves on the Utah Controlled Substance Advisory Committee which advises the State Legislature on the scheduling of controlled substances.

- **Kacy Robinson**

- Kacy Robinson, M.S. Fatality Review Specialist, Department of Health and Human Services.

Kacy coordinates five Fatality Review Committees: Child Fatality Review Committee, Domestic Violence Fatality Review Committee, Opioid Overdose Fatality Review Committee, Sudden Death in the Young Advanced Clinical Review Committee, and the Child Suicide Fatality Review Committee.

As coordinator, she is responsible for identifying cases for review; performing all research and record collection for case reviews, meeting facilitation and collection of recommendations, which identify service gaps and populations vulnerable to violence/injury; and promote health and well-being for all Utahans.

- **Megan Broekemeier**

- Megan Broekemeier works as a fatal drug overdose research coordinator in the Utah Office of the Medical Examiner (OME) at the Department of Health and Human Services. Megan works to improve fatal drug overdose surveillance in Utah. In addition to improving epidemiological data on fatal overdose, Megan has implemented a new data collection system at the OME to gather valuable information that informs prevention efforts, including in-depth demographic information, physical and mental health histories, substance use histories, and other factors that lead to more targeted, meaningful prevention work. This is achieved through interviews with drug overdose loss survivors. Megan holds

a bachelor's degree in business and a master's degree in public health from the University of Montana. When not in the office, Megan loves to be outside with her family.

- **Reshma Arrington**

- Reshma Arrington works as Public Health Analyst (PHA) with the CDC as a member of Utah's Overdose Response Strategy (ORS). The mission of the ORS is to help communities reduce fatal and non-fatal drug overdoses by connecting public health and public safety agencies, sharing information, and supporting evidence-based interventions.

- **Dr. Mike Moss**

- Dr. Moss is medical director of the Utah Poison Control Center and faculty in the department of Emergency Medicine at the University of Utah. He attended medical school at The Ohio State University College of Medicine, completed residency and served as chief resident in Emergency Medicine at Virginia Commonwealth University, and completed a fellowship in medical toxicology at Oregon Health & Science University. He is board certified in medical toxicology, addiction medicine, and emergency medicine. He cares for patients with overdose and substance use disorders on a daily basis. His research interests included monitoring novel psychoactive substance use in Utah. He collaborates with many agencies and stakeholders on the Utah Drug Monitoring Initiative to better inform the state's response to ongoing issues with drug use in Utah.

- **Will Janisch**

- Will Janisch has been the Drug Intelligence Officer for Montana since September of 2021. He is a U.S. Army veteran who served as an HUMINT Collector in the U.S. Army Reserves from 2006 to 2014. Will worked as a Counter-Intelligence Screener in Iraq in 2011 and at Fort Meade, MD from 2011 to 2013. Will began his law enforcement career in North Dakota and most recently worked as Patrol Sergeant with the Yuma County Sheriff's Office in Colorado. He has worked as a Correctional Officer, Emergency Medical Dispatcher, Police Officer, Deputy Sheriff, & Patrol Sergeant.

- **Bryce Sherwood**
  - Bryce Sherwood is the Community Health Division Director at the Weber-Morgan Health Department. He earned his Bachelor of Health Promotion and Human Performance and Master of Health Administration from Weber State University. He has worked in several capacities in Public Health at the local and state health departments. He has also worked with the FDA for tobacco enforcement and inspections. Bryce also got to work on several local and state coalitions. Specifically, the Ogden Civic Action Network, OCAN, has been a coalition that has been a catalyst for community change. The main areas of focus are Housing, Access to Quality Care, Healthy Lifestyles, and Opioid Prevention. Bryce has participated on the Opioid Prevention Committee for the last several years. This committee has been able to provide Naloxone to the community, create and distribute an Opioid toolkit, create an Opioid Emergency Response Plan, and a strategic plan for the next several years.
